Diane T. Chamberlain, South Dennis



Diane has spent decades protecting the health of Dennis residents and the environment of the Mid Cape. As a nurse with a Duke University degree, Diane built a career rooted in care, service, and responsibility, including roles at Massachusetts General Hospital and Boston Children's Hospital. She brought the same dedication home, serving Dennis as a public health leader, neighbor, and trusted presence. For more than two decades, Diane has served on the Dennis Board of Health, becoming a steady and respected advocate for public health, environmental stewardship, and thoughtful local decision-making.

Her most significant contribution has been her leadership on water quality and wastewater planning. Over years of service on the Wastewater Implementation Committee, including participation in hundreds of water quality planning meetings, Diane helped lay the foundation for the Town of Dennis to take on the vital work of watershed restoration and long-term water resource protection, and to pass a long-sought sewerage project. Diane's life and service reflect her professional skill, civic dedication, and personal commitment to her community. Diane is recognized not only for her many years of service, but also for her enduring role in helping make a cleaner, healthier future possible.

Shareen Davis, Chatham



Shareen is a 13th generation Cape Codder whose work has empowered women and strengthened her coastal community for decades. A commercial fisherwoman, business owner, and advocate, she has worked tirelessly alongside her family in the fishing industry. For over 30 years, Shareen has mentored women in a traditionally male dominated field, helping them navigate fisheries, leadership roles, and civic engagement. She was part of the Fishermen's Wives Coalition that secured a Congressional act to dredge Chatham Harbor, ensuring safe access to the fishing pier. She has served on the Chatham Select Board since 2017 and now works as kitchen and marketing manager of the Chatham Harvesters Cooperative, promoting sustainable fishing and supporting local fishermen. She serves as an outreach coordinator with the Massachusetts Fishermen's Partnership, assisting with safety, insurance, and advocacy. Through her photography and community work, she supports scholarships for children of fishing families and inspires connection through art, food, and storytelling. Her leadership reflects resilience, mentorship, and a deep commitment to community and sustainability.

Nell Fields, East Falmouth



The Rev. Nell Fields has built a career defined by leadership, innovation, and service. A former editor and journalist, she spent much of her career as a publisher for a publicly traded newspaper company in Los Angeles before transitioning into executive roles in the technology and financial services sectors at Korn Ferry International and First Data Corporation.

For the past 15 years, Nell has served as minister at the Waquoit Congregational Church United Church of Christ in Falmouth. From the moment she joined the community, she committed herself to being more than a spiritual leader by actively convening conversations and initiatives that address local challenges and social justice issues.

Nell is deeply involved in community organizations, including the Falmouth Clergy Association, Upper Cape Interfaith Alliance, and No Place for Hate Falmouth. She serves on the advisory board for Belonging to Each Other, a program assisting individuals experiencing homelessness, and contributes to Neighborhood Falmouth and the Falmouth Service Center, where she chairs the Community Engagement and Inclusion Committee. She holds degrees in journalism, English, and divinity, and is also the author of two method patents. Nell's work reflects a lifelong commitment to innovation, inclusion, and community building.

She supports the Taunton Diversity Network, the Taunton Animal Shelter, VFW Post 61, Boston Children's Hospital, the Greater Boston Food Bank, the Epilepsy Foundation, and more. A breast cancer survivor, Cindy is an ardent supporter of the American Cancer Society's Relay for Life. Last year, she co-chaired "Flower Power," raising \$1,000 to benefit female vets. Rebecca Frias has served as Director of the Freetown Council on Aging since 2023 and, in that short time, has transformed the department’s energy and reach. Under her leadership, the COA has expanded critical services, such as the “Brown Bag” Food Program, operated in partnership with the Greater Boston Food Bank, which provides drive-up and delivery groceries to community members in need. She has also introduced a wide range of new senior programs, from yoga and fitness classes to brick-oven pizza parties and senior-focused health initiatives—ensuring both care and connection for Freetown’s aging population. Prior to becoming director, Rebecca was a licensed social worker, providing compassionate counseling to patients and families navigating cancer. She earned her undergraduate degree from Roger Williams University and a Master of Science in Social Work from Columbia University. A devoted wife and mother of two, Rebecca is known not only for her professional accomplishments but for her genuine kindness and warmth, which she brings to every interaction. She truly embodies the values of a Massachusetts Commonwealth Heroine.

Rosemary Gill, Dartmouth

Rosemary Gill is the President and CEO of the Zeiterion Theatre (The Z), where she has devoted nearly two decades to stewarding one of the South Coast’s most treasured cultural landmarks. Over the past ten years, she led the transformative \$37 million restoration and renovation of the beloved 100-year-old theater—an ambitious project preserving its historic character while positioning it for a vibrant new century. Under her leadership, The Z has strengthened both its artistic reach and its economic impact. A Dartmouth native, Rosemary has worked in New Bedford for most of her adult life and cares deeply about the community she calls home. She and her husband, Michael, have been married for 39 years and share two children and four grandchildren. Rosemary joined The Z in 2007 as Assistant Director, was promoted to Executive Director in 2013, and became President and CEO in 2022. Her leadership has earned recognition from national and regional arts funders, as well as numerous community awards for advancing cultural life in the region.

In addition to her service in the Army, Michelle has been a longtime member of Rolling Thunder MA Chapter 2, a nonprofit organization dedicated to honoring prisoners of war and those missing in action. In her role, Michelle’s mission is centered on ensuring veterans receive the support, benefits, and recognition they deserve. She assists returning Massachusetts veterans in applying for state wartime bonuses and helps disabled veterans and Gold Star families apply for annuities. She guides veterans through disability claims with the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs and administers Chapter 115 assistance to eligible veterans and their families. Additionally, she connects veterans with education, training, and employment resources, provides counseling and referrals, and educates them on available services. Through her work, Michelle is committed to strengthening the veteran community and integrating veterans into the fabric of Foxborough.

After graduating in 1974, she became Northeastern's first female athletic trainer and one of the earliest women certified by the National Athletic Trainers' Association. She was later named Woman of the Year and awarded a men's varsity letter sweater for her contributions. Returning to Stoneham in 1979, Craigie dedicated herself to public service through the school system, serving as an athletic trainer until 1986 and supporting generations of student-athletes. She went on to serve 18 years on the School Committee and Finance Board, helping guide policy, support education and oversee financial decisions.

For the past nine years, Craigie has served as Town Moderator, presiding over meetings and encouraging civic participation. She remains actively involved in key community efforts, including the Stoneham High School Building Project Committee, School Building Committee, and Stoneham 300 Committee. Jeanne's lifelong dedication has made a lasting impact on both students and the broader community. She and her husband, Paul, continue to call Stoneham home.

Now, as part of her daughter/dad duo, Sophia is taking their long-running podcast show on the road, going to 14 senior centers this year to talk about accessory dwelling units (ADUs) and the critical role they play for senior citizens. ADUs are her passion, which prompted her to create ADU Blessing. The goal: to build an ADU for a veteran in need. Sophia has been giving back to her community for several years. In 2022, she helped her mother run a medical supply drive to help Ukrainians. While the effort was dear to her heart, as her mother is from Ukraine, she wanted to help all Ukraine citizens suffering from the impact of the war. Already owner of her own company and the youngest person on record to be certified as a construction supervisor, Sophia wants to show other girls and young women what is possible for them in the male-dominated construction industry. It's worth pointing out Sophia does all of that while maintaining a 3.9 GPA and taking courses at Harvard University.

Today, she remains active in her community as a fair housing advocate and amateur printmaker. A mother, grandmother, and great-grandmother, Jane continues to be an inspiring and joyful force for social justice and community engagement.

Victoria Selser, Sterling



Victoria Selser is an Epidemiologist with the City of Fitchburg Health Department and the Montachusett Public Health Network, a regional collaborative of local health departments in north central MA. Her public health journey began during the early stages of the COVID-19 pandemic, just as she was completing her undergraduate degree in microbiology at the University of Massachusetts Amherst. As Massachusetts was scaling up the pandemic response, Victoria joined the public health workforce in April 2020 as a Contact Tracer for the Community Tracing Collaborative (CTC) – a joint project between the Massachusetts Department of Public Health and the global health nonprofit Partners in Health (PIH). She later transferred to the specialized unit within the CTC known as the Epidemic Intelligence Unit, where her role as an Outbreak Specialist involved collaborating with local health departments to identify, investigate, and respond to suspected outbreaks of COVID-19.

Victoria's experience of working with PIH shaped her views on health equity and justice and fostered her commitment to improving health outcomes. Following the closure of the CTC in December 2021, Victoria transitioned to her current role as a local health Epidemiologist. In this role, her responsibilities range from analyzing data to evaluate community health needs to administering community-based clinical and educational public health interventions, to grant-writing, to managing and responding to reportable conditions. Most notably, Victoria identified gaps in healthcare access in her communities and worked to establish a free clinic, now formally known as the North Central Free Medical Program. She also currently serves on NACCHO's Epidemiology Workgroup.

Karen Spencer, Uxbridge

Karen is a Commonwealth Heroine because of her unwavering dedication to empowering young girls and strengthening communities across Worcester County. As Executive Director of Girls on the Run Worcester County since 2014, Karen has transformed a small pilot program serving just 69 girls at three sites into a thriving, countywide initiative reaching thousands of participants each year. Through her leadership, the program has expanded to serve communities across nearly every town in the region, ultimately impacting more than 6,000 girls. Karen's work goes far beyond program growth. She has championed a mission that combines physical activity with social-emotional learning, helping girls build confidence, develop healthy relationships, and navigate real-life challenges such as bullying, peer pressure, and self-doubt. Her commitment was especially evident during the COVID-19 pandemic, when she took a personal pay cut and led creative fundraising efforts to ensure the program could continue serving girls during a time of isolation and uncertainty. Under Karen's leadership, Girls on the Run Worcester County has also prioritized accessibility and inclusion by securing funding and scholarships so that all girls, regardless of background, can participate. She has built strong partnerships with schools, volunteers, and community organizations, creating a lasting network of support for youth. Karen Spencer's vision, resilience, and passion have made a profound and lasting impact, inspiring thousands of girls to recognize their potential and become confident, compassionate leaders in their communities. This is all why Karen is without a doubt a Commonwealth Heroine.

Karen Swindell, Milford

Karen Swindell is a mother, educator, and advocate for those living with substance use disorder. She and her husband Dave raised their family in Milford. After a series of sports injuries that introduced their son Christopher to oxycontin, the family began to grapple with his substance use. In 2018, after years of support groups and on the night before his sister's wedding, Chris passed away due to a relapse. Amazingly, and inspirationally, Karen channeled this immense heartbreak into giving back to the community her son and her family loved so much. In August of 2019, one year after Chris's death, Karen and Dave held Milford's first Overdose Awareness Day. Soon after that, Karen began working with Amy Leone of Community Impact, an organization that offers services specializing in opioids and alcohol use treatment. Through Worcester County District Attorney Early's office, they secured a Department of Justice grant for over \$1 million to open a new center in Milford, named after her son, to treat members of the community. Chris' Corner opened its doors in the Spring of 2020. Karen is still a regular presence at Chris' Corner, serving as a dedicated volunteer and group facilitator. Karen has supported countless parents—especially mothers—who are navigating the unimaginable loss of a child. Karen embodies Chris' message and carries it forward through her life's mission: to support others, build community, and remind people they are not alone.

The Meaning of the Yellow Rose



The yellow rose is a prominent symbol for suffragists, representing support for women's right to vote. Women struggled for years to be included in the Constitution as voting members of the population. Courageous suffragists faced jail, hunger strikes, years of organizing, ridicule, and great disappointment before ultimately achieving full suffrage when the 19th Amendment was fully ratified in 1920. They came from rural and urban backgrounds, different economic classes, different races, and different generations, but shared one goal: **equal rights and opportunities for all.**

They worked together. Diversity became their strength as they united under a symbol: the yellow rose. The yellow rose stood for unity, friendship, and determination. Today, the yellow rose reminds us that our own work to improve the status of women in the Commonwealth is ongoing, and requires diversity, unity, and determination. We must strive for victory in our own peaceful revolutions.

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
